The Casuarina Project is Surf Coast Shire's Community Capacity Building program. Casuarina is a Council subsidised leadership training program available to community members, and consists of a series of six facilitated workshops held at locations around the Shire. The Casuarina Project is primarily a community development program, designed to support community strengthening within and between Surf Coast Shire communities. It aims to develop an active network of community members and to provide them with the skills to plan, fund and successfully deliver community projects.

Casuarina forms an important part of Council's community strengthening and community planning objectives, linking directly to a number of the priorities as outlined in the 2009-2013 Council Plan, namely:

Sustainable and protected natural environments

- Leadership and community partnerships that promote environmental awareness
- A community that is engaged in responding to climate change

Healthy, resilient, safe communities

- Strong communities that embrace challenges and opportunities
- Inclusive communities that have a sense of pride and connection to where they Live
- Communities that are better prepared in the event of an emergency

Sustainable development and growth

- Ecologically sustainable development
- Development that adds to our quality of life and promotes a sense of place

The Casuarina Tree

Although not a numerous species, various types of Casuarina (or She Oak) are indigenous to virtually the entire Surf Coast Shire. Examples can be found scattered both on the coast and dotted on the hinterland plains.

It is an enduring tree of great strength. The Casuarina's tight grained heartwood reveals warmth and a deep inner beauty when crafted. Regenerating both from seed and as new growth springing from its roots, the Casuarina patiently brings new life into a sometimes-challenging environment.
